1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

This report summarises the findings of the Community Views Survey carried out as part of the community engagement process designed to inform the preparation of the Meigle and Ardler Community Action Plan. The plan will help guide community development over the next 5 years in the Meigle and Ardler area, help define priorities for action, and be a focus for the work of our community organisations working in partnership with the public and private sector.

Other elements of the community engagement process include:

- Stakeholder interviews (zoom) and online questionnaire
- Preparation of a community profile
- An online Community Futures Event week

The Community Action Plan is being led by a Steering Group which brings together representatives of Meigle and Ardler Community Development Trust, Meigle and Ardler Community Council, GrowBiz, Perth & Kinross Council including a local Councillor, and local residents.

1.2 Survey Organisation

The Survey Form was designed by STAR Development Group and tailored with the Steering Group, who particularly thought it was also relevant to include questions in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. An Easy Ready version was made available where relevant.

The Steering Group agreed there was a sense of perspective regards the pandemic across both villages and that the community would respond well to the traditional method of physical delivery and collection of a Household Survey, but with modifications. The survey was delivered to approximately 300 houses across various defined areas of Meigle and Ardler. The survey was also available online and the online link/associated QR Code were promoted heavily on the paper copies and through various networks and social media platforms.

1.3 Survey Response

A total of 86 completed Community Views Surveys were received, including 51 online surveys and 35 collected from households. Of those who responded and provided their age:

2 were aged 5-11 years
2 were aged 12-17 years
0 were aged 18-24 years
15 were aged 25-44 years
19 were aged 45-59 years
21 were aged 60-69 years
20 were aged 70-79 years

1.4 Themes & Quotes

- Key themes were verified after two independent reviews were performed

2.1 Nature of the Place

A significant number of residents (67%) recognised the rural and quiet nature of their villages and felt it was a safe community to live in. They also acknowledged that it was an attractive place of a small size.

2.2 Environment and Open Spaces

There is a strong sense of appreciation for the beauty of the Meigle and Ardler area and the ability to walk out of the front door and access magnificent scenery, many walking routes and an abundance of wildlife.

2.3 Community Spirit and Friendliness

Community spirit featured highly with many commenting on how they valued the friendliness and the fact people speak to and support each other. In particular, the community response to COVID-19 made residents proud to be part of the area.

2.4 Location

Over a third of respondents said they liked the fact that they could live a quiet village life but were easily within reach of other close by communities or larger cities. The hills and mountains also appealed when describing the location.

2.5 Services and Transport

Local services were valued and said to be more than sufficient for such a small area. In Ardler, the local pub was viewed as the hub of the community. Transport was said to be very good.

2.6 Community Facilities, Activities, Groups, Events

Some positive reference was made to community events and facilities and in particular the efforts made for the Christmas Lights. The ongoing work at the bowling club was also noted and the local cricket club was highlighted as the main sporting activity.

3.1 Roads, Traffic and Parking

In Meigle the two main routes, the A94 and the Dundee Road, were said to be increasingly busy with speeding vehicles of all types. In Ardler, the main issues focused on the frequency and size of articulated lorries driving through, which in turn resulted in further comments regarding persistent noise and vibration. Generally, comments were also made about the potential impact of the Cross Tay Link Road.

“Tractors that speed through Ardler village at a much much greater speed than 20mph”

“Our house is inches away from Dundee Road and we dislike the volume of traffic and the speed at which some of it passes our front door”

“We have an abundance of heavy vehicles going to and from Pete Grewars farm”

“Despite recent works – which have been poorly planned – traffic through Meigle is still as problematic as ever, & this will only be exacerbated by the proposed Cross-Tay link”

“In the dark, junctions on Forfar Road poorly marked”

“Meeting big articulated trucks as they come down Washington Brae”

“There are no electric car charging points”

“For public transport we need to go in the car to Meigle where parking is very limited”

3.2 Nature of the Place

Some respondents felt more people need to get behind community activities and also raised concerns that people living in the area, but commuting to work elsewhere, were not integrating. A lack of communication was mooted and, in some cases, respondents felt the Community Council should be more accountable. A very small number of respondents also referred to feeling unsafe due to nearby residents but lacked support to resolve this. Residents living in the more outlying areas also reported they felt isolated from the villages.

“Living on the periphery of the village, apart from dog walking, it’s difficult to make new social contacts”

“It feels like those new to the area take time to be accepted locally”

“I feel very much on the outside – my postcode is Ardler and I feel that I live in Ardler but I don’t think I am always “officially” in Ardler”

“Number of commuter residents who do not use local services and do not engage with the local community”

“Concerns about the volume of new houses either under construction or future proposed construction”

“The lovely glenluie new builds. They have totally spoilt that part of the village”

3.3 Environment and Village Appearance

Only 24% of all respondents said there were factors they did not like about the Environment and Village Appearance but of those, a large number said they were unhappy with inconsiderate locals and visitors dropping litter, the level of flytipping and dog fouling in the area. Over a third also stated that the constant damage to verges and muddy roads needs to be addressed. Some respondents also disliked the fact different areas of the community are difficult to access in a walking/cycle friendly way.

“No footpath/cycle path out to Lanlogie area – road too busy and fast moving to risk without this”

“Unable to walk into Meigle – road far too busy and no pavement”

“The square is lovely but the rest of the village, in particular Dundee Road, is not as aesthetically pleasing, despite there being lots of space”

3.4 Transport

Whilst there is a reasonable bus service to Meigle, the main criticisms were aimed at insufficient route options. A smaller number of respondents also described evening and weekend services as being inadequate. In Ardler, there is no bus service at all and it is unsafe to walk 2 miles to Meigle to catch a bus.

3.5 Amenities and Services

Comments from over half of respondents clearly indicated a lack of facilities such as a shop or a village hall in Ardler and that poor broadband/phone signals also impacted negatively on Ardler village life and outlying houses. A third of residents disliked the lack of shops, takeaways etc. and voiced concerns around the school potentially closing.

3.6 Community Facilities and Activities

A small proportion (8%) referenced a lack of activities for different age groups but also concerns that clubs had closed. One person thought there were no events but perhaps this was down to poor communication of things happening.

4.1 Community Facilities, Activities, Groups, Events

The need for more activities for all age groups is clear but people wanted more events/gatherings to bring everyone together more frequently. Better communication about what is happening in the area was mentioned several times and for this to be available in different formats other than Facebook. Ardler residents felt strongly about the need for a community focus such as a community garden or village hall, with the focus in Meigle aimed at a more modern hall fit for purpose. Some residents also proposed bigger parks to accommodate the growing population in the area.

“Having a local bowling club and tennis club in summer, also local football and badminton clubs in winter”

“Kinloch needs a major rethink/rebuild to accommodate a wider range of activities”

“Modern and spacious community hall”

“Better accessibility for those in wheelchairs or using buggies/prams”

“A community type garden area/square in Ardler utilising the spare land in Wallace Street”

“A community space in Ardler”

“A village hall or meeting room to enable groups to start up and support those living alone” [Ardler]

“A bigger play park”

“A bigger swing park. The one in the village is very small as it is and with the new builds it won’t be able to accommodate all the extra children”

“An enormous playpark”

“The park area is a blank canvas that could be a far more attractive place to visit. More seating would be a small start”

4.2 Transport

Across the board, people wanted a wider variety of route options as well as shorter journey times. Thirty two percent of residents also commented on the need for a better timetable across the whole day/week. The Ardler residents expressed very clearly that there is a need for a bus service to be started, even if it is only a few times a week.

4.3 Village Enhancement and Environment

Half of respondents felt much more could be done to link up different communities with new foot and cycle paths - safety would also be improved for walkers and cyclists in many cases too. Solutions to litter and flytipping were needed according to a small number of residents. And whilst one respondent would like expansion of the village to stop, another suggested eco-friendly housing would be welcomed. More should also be done to celebrate the uniqueness of the area and one of the youngest residents to respond proposed a central focus in the village.

4.4 Local Economy and Tourism

It was recognised that more needs to be done to attract visitors, offer them more amenities and to specifically develop the area with tourism in mind. It was suggested that the Belmont Estate and Castle/Stables could be developed and used to the area’s advantage. Almost a third of people said there should be more and bigger shops, with increased opening hours of the Post Office. Childcare was also highlighted as an area for development. It is clear from responses that residents felt more could also be done for businesses to start, to access office space and have ongoing support. A few residents also said they would like to have more local produce and crafts available.

“Redeveloping the Belmont Estate (including the castle) to make this a tourist hub where locals and visitors explore our local woodland”

“Small businesses providing employment”

“Provision for small business development ‘easy in/easy out’ licences for trade or retail workspaces. Easy access to good start up advice for small businesses”

“Redevelopment/re-use and restoration of Belmont Castle and Stables”

“Take opportunity to promote local produce/crafts etc. and market in square”

“More local produce”

4.5 Traffic, Roads and Parking

A significant number of residents were keen for the volume of traffic and speed of traffic to be reduced across the whole area, but in particular on the Dundee Road, A94 and through Ardler. Heavy vehicles are a particular issue noted in Ardler and whilst accepting of living in an agricultural area, better controls were recommended.

“Life for residents at west end of Main Street would be made much more bearable if there were a direct link to East Ardler Farm from the Washie Brae, avoiding Main Street”

“Create proper passing places up Washington Brae – there are some very wide vehicles coming down this road”

“Public parking that doesn’t block the Dundee Road including coaches that have nowhere to park when visitors go to the museum”

“Car parking”

“Electric car charging points would be one thing”

4.6 Amenities and Services

The need for improvements to broadband and mobile phone coverage were the most noticeable, particularly for those residents who live even a short distance outside the main villages. A request for a bigger post box in Ardler and a police presence occasionally was also noted. Over a quarter of respondents said there was a need for more and better pubs, and 11% indicated a need for public toilets.
